Volunteer Requirements

To become a volunteer, you must:

- Fill out an application
- Have a personal interview
- Complete lab work
- Attend general orientation to the hospital
- Complete training in your area of interest

After you have completed training, we ask that you contribute regularly over a specified time commitment depending on your area of service. Part-time residents are welcome! Contact the Volunteer Services Department to set up an interview.

Volunteers

Patient Care areas

Volunteers in the Patient Care areas may work in the Primary Care Unit (PCU), Intensive Care Unit (ICU), or the Obstetrics Department. These volunteers provide extra comfort and care to our patients. As a Patient Care Volunteer, you will be working directly with patients and their families, as well as the staff. Some of your duties might include delivering newspapers and flowers, passing out beverages and snacks, transporting patients, and assisting with paperwork or other projects.

Living Center Volunteers

Living Center Volunteers provide support, understanding and companionship to our residents. You may participate in group activities such as card games, tea time, music, reading, movies and outings or visit with residents one-on-one.

Gift Shop Volunteers

Operate the Gift Shop located in the main lobby area. Responsibilities include handling sales of gift shop items, stocking shelves and wrapping purchases. If you love greeting people and helping with their shopping needs, this is the place for you! All proceeds from the shop benefit SJMC programs.



Information Desk Volunteers

Greet patients and visitors as they arrive at the hospital. Your cheery smile will welcome our patients and visitors. Answering phones and directing or escorting patients are all a part of the Information Desk Volunteer's duties.

Lay Chaplain Volunteers

Lay Chaplains provide non-denominational spiritual support to patients, residents and families. Responsibilities include offering to listen to or pray with someone, contacting a clergy member if requested, or simply visiting with someone in need of company. Lay Chaplains meet once a month and require training classes and shadowing before working on their own.

Clerical & Administrative Help

Clerical & Administrative Help Volunteers work in different departments throughout the hospital as needed. Patient Accounting, MRI and the Front Desk are all departments that can use an extra hand with filing, copying and other various projects. The SJMC Foundation, the Marketing Department and the Health Institute might need help at different times throughout the year with events such as the Health Fair and Old Bills Fun Run.
